Pray for what Jesus prayed for.

The days between Ascension and Pentecost are a time of special Prayer: they are the very first novena of prayer, when the Apostles and the Blessed Mother waited in prayer in the Upper Room. They were not waiting passively, but in anticipation that the Holy Spirit, the Advocate, would descend as Jesus promised, and give them power and gifts for mission and direct them how to continue to follow the Risen Christ. Let us, too, fill these days with expectant and prayerful hope for the gifts of this same Spirit confident, that just as the Lord worked through the disciples, he calls us his friends and invites us into a life of transformation and power. So, pray for the Holy Spirit to touch your life afresh in the coming days. Use them to pray for a fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon us and the whole Church. You could join with others by praying, for example, the Pentecost Novena prepared in the Diocese of Baltimore this year (details and prayers here).

In the Gospel reading on Sunday we hear another part of Jesus' long final prayer for his disciples (Chapter 17 of St John's Gospel) – his 'last will and testament', or his Farewell Discourse – during the Last Supper before he offered himself for them on the Cross. Though he was speaking to the disciples, he also addresses us, and all the members of his Church. On recent Sundays, we have heard his desire to remain in us, and that we

should remain in him. And, he has given his great commandment: to 'love one another' as he has loved us, by laying down his life for the friends who do what he has commanded.

Now, the final excerpt from his prayer which we hear this weekend (and, also, the teaching from Saint John's First Letter) challenges us to pray about our relationship with the Risen Lord today and all that it could be: what does he desire for us? What does Jesus pray for?

Jesus speaks of his 'joy', which he shares with his disciples as he reveals what we shall become when we 'remain in him'. What is Jesus' desire as he prays for us? That we be 'consecrated in the truth', that we become holy through putting into practice everything he has shared with us in his teaching. His great desire is that we may be equipped to undertake the mission he wants us to carry out, and for this he empowers us by sending his Holy Spirit.

The heart of what Jesus taught the disciples was his teaching about prayer. He wishes those who become his disciples should **pray to God as 'our Father'**, just as he does – so we obediently follow his teaching and pray 'Our Father' daily, above all at Mass. In his Farewell Discourse, **he also prays** that we may be true to the Father's name so **that we become one**, **as he and his Father are one**. Of course, the relationship of Jesus with God his Father is utterly unique, he alone is the eternal Son of God. Yet his manifest desire is that we too (all his followers, all his disciples) become one with the Father and the Son in the Holy Spirit, as they come and make their dwelling within us. You and I have been created for this unimaginable closeness between God and ourselves.

He is praying for the Church, his Body, of which we are parts. Unity with the three persons of the Blessed Trinity means we are united with all who belong to God. Through being united with the Blessed Trinity, we will be empowered to become Jesus' witnesses in the 'world'. Hence disunity among Christians is such a grave matter – it flies in the face of Jesus' Great Commandment, of that unity in love he desires for his followers. It contradicts the witness we hope to give. So, in this week we Christians should again pray for Christian Unity.

Jesus sends his disciples (us) 'into the world'. His prayer is that we will accept this mission he gives us, to share the truth Jesus has shared with us. As he did on Ascension Day, before he ascended to his Father, Jesus commands us to do what his Father had sent him to do: to help everyone know the 'truth', the truth about God and his forgiving, fatherly love for all. If we have inwardly 'seen' this truth, we will be able to testify 'that the Father sent his Son as saviour of the world' (1 John 4, 14).

After the Ascension, Jesus does 'not leave us orphans.' At every Eucharist, we gather to celebrate the truth of his promise, that he really is 'with us always', feeding us with his Body and Blood, present in and among us, praying for us. **His prayer is that when we** discover this is so, we **become convincing witnesses**. This mission is integral to why the Father sent him among us, why Jesus gathered followers to himself, why he forms us by his Holy Spirit into the community that is his Body in the world today, the Church.
